
1956 - 'LITTLE OLYMPICS' CARNIVAL AT THE YALLOURN OVAL

Only a dream two years ago, now...

YALLOURN TO GET LITTLE GAMES

MORWELL, Monday: The little Olympic Games are coming to Yallourn, the little country town which is the heart of Victoria's power and light. What seemed a dream two years ago is coming true on December 2.

Local amateur athletic club members are frequent visitors these days to Olympic Village, calling on managers of world teams and inviting entries for a Yallourn athletics meeting the day after this section of the Games finishes at Melbourne.

Harry Hopman will officially open the Yallourn Games. Managers of the visiting Games teams have still to select their teams, and Yallourn will know later this week who will take part in the Little Olympics.

Promises have been given from Russia, Italy, Greece, and entries have been made by Liberia, Burma, India, England, Australia, the Argentine, Uruguay, and Nationalist China.

A crowd of more than 20,000 is expected at the Yallourn meeting, which has the support of the whole town.

A special train will run from Melbourne for athletes, managers, and visitors.

NOTE The above comment regarding the arena being a swamp 'not long ago' was 'not entirely' accurate as the arena/oval was established by the Yallourn Oval Trust in 1926. Furthermore, when Len Hutton's MCC touring team played against a Gippsland XI, at Yallourn in February 1955, the Yallourn Oval was described as the best country ground ...

"The English cricketers, visiting pressmen and commentators, Australian and international, had nothing but praise for the Yallourn Oval, which they described as the best country ground they have ever seen on tour." 'Morwell Advertiser.'



George Roubanis of Greece won the pole vault at Yallourn in 1956. George was born in 1929 in Thessalonica. He competed at three Olympic Games; and was named the '1956 Greek Athlete of the Year.' At the 1956 Melbourne Olympic Games, he won a bronze medal in the pole vault, as he cleared 4.50 m (a Greek record at the time).



THE FOLLOWING EXTRACTS REGARDING THE LITTLE OLYMPICS CARNIVAL AT YALLOURN IN 1956, HAVE BEEN POSTED ON THE VIRTUAL YALLOURN WEBSITE.

"The 1956 Melbourne Olympic Games were a catalyst to a greater emphasis in athletics in school sports programs and local clubs (e.g. Yallourn Amateur Athletics Club which was formed in 1951). Younger readers may not be aware that, in 1956, Yallourn hosted a 'Mini Olympics' and it was imposing sporting spectacle. It is documented that some thirteen thousand people visited Yallourn to watch the program of events which included numerous international Olympians..." "Vic, Barry, Betty and Lois also were members of the Yallourn Amateur Athletic Club (formed in 1951). One of the biggest days in the town's sporting history was in 1956 when the club hosted a major athletic carnival, sometimes known as the 'Mini Olympics,' at the Yallourn Oval. International athletes, who were in Melbourne for the Olympic Games, travelled to Yallourn that weekend and participated in the special program of track and field events. As President of the YAAC, Vic Gust played a key role in the organization of the events and Lois was very proud of her father and her family and, of course, the town that day." "...I understand that my dad (Bill) was always very involved with the community and athletics in Yallourn, and I believe ran marathons, and was a very fit man. After the 1956 Olympics had been on in Melbourne, some of the athletes wanted to stay back for a bit of a holiday, whatever.

So some enterprising types from the Yallourn Amateur Athletic Club, invited a number of Olympic athletes to attend a "mini-Olympics" in Yallourn organised by the YAAC, so they all came down on the/a train, and I believe it was a great success, both for the athletes who had a great experience and were welcomed in to a "multicultural" community, but also for the organisers, who no doubt would have been told "it's not possible/ you'll never pull it off", etc. etc. I am not sure what role my father played, if any, but certainly my dad had always been a 'possibilitarian!'
