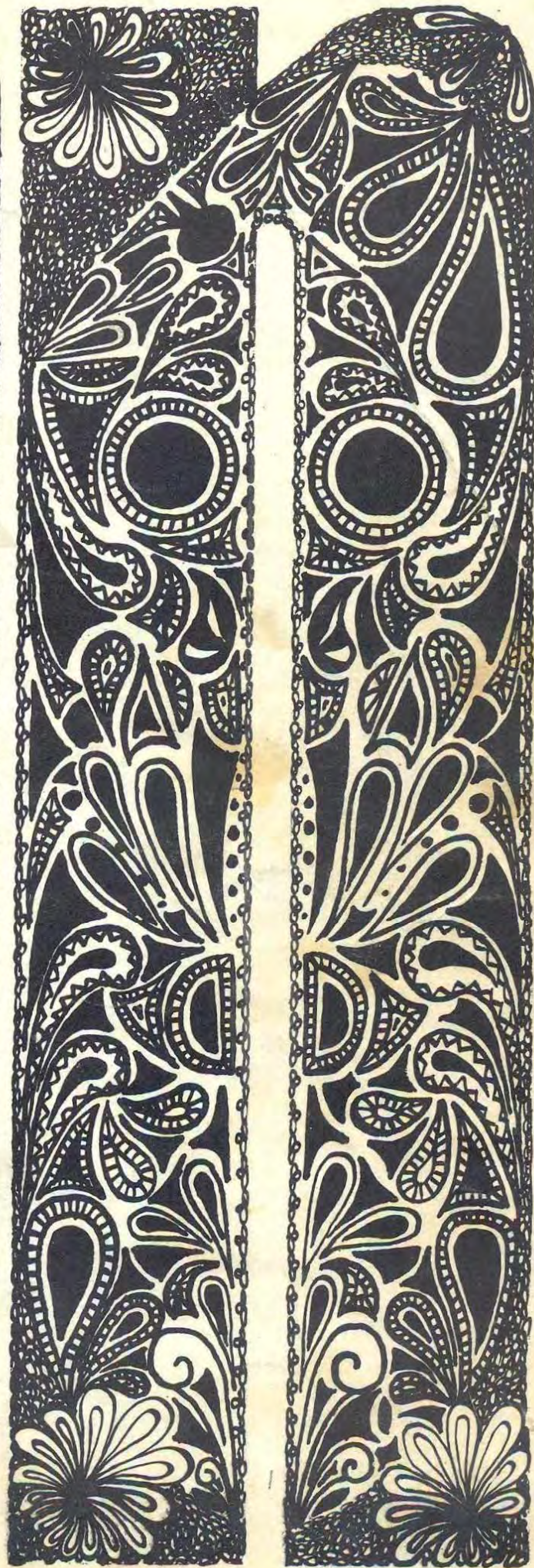
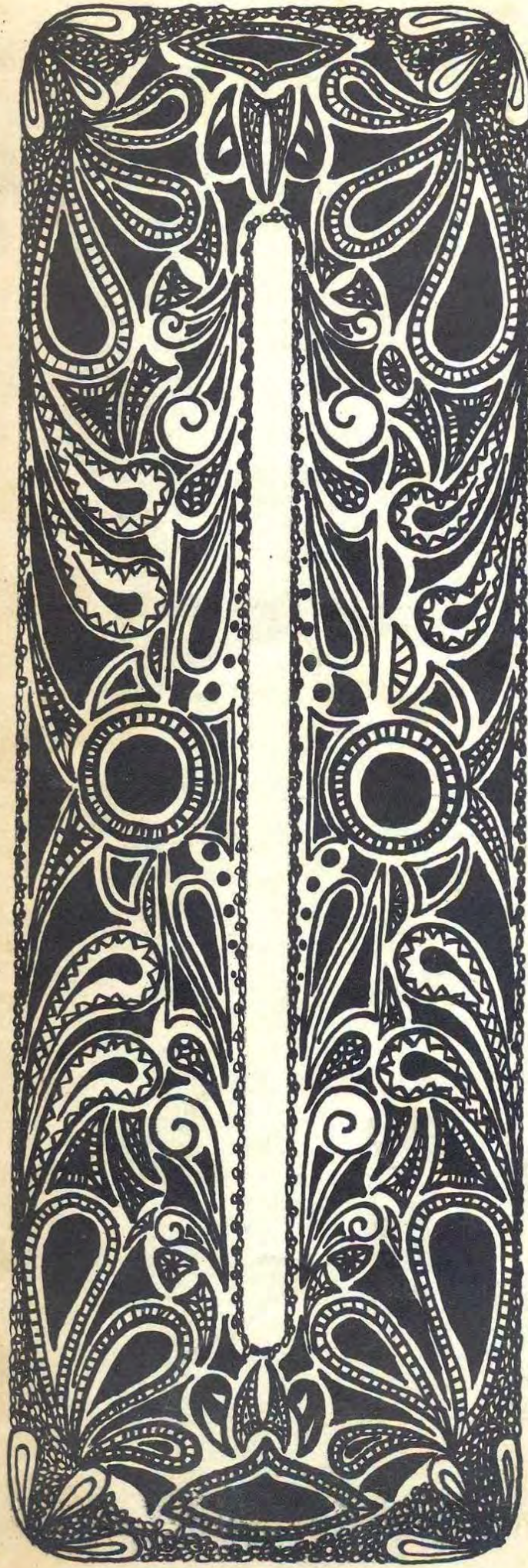


PYLON YALLOURN HIGH SCHOOL '67

The first day I was here I saw Mr. Wilson in shorts and a boy whistled at him. I've got used to it now and I think it is quiet all right.

For the rest of the day I just stood round doing nothing.

On the second day Mr. Woodard saw me down the street eating a cream cake, I thought I was a gonna at first but I guess he had a kind heart then but not any more.

At resess everyone was looking for the toilets and there freinds.

The hardest of all I think was making friends, you get to know a person and you find they don't like you so you have to start all over again.

It took me about a week to get everything right. Now I know the rooms and the teachers off by heart.

And there was a piece of paper called the Daily Bulleton. We read this each day to find out if we are to see Mr. Harrison or not.

The worst of all was when Mr. Phillips kick us out of History for letting off a couple of stink bombs, they didn't even smell.

In the first year I was put in 1b and for the first few days we did nothing but sit in a scrapped study class room doing nothing. That year was a fairly boring year and everybody was glad to get to the Christmas Holidays.

But all in all its pretty good (for a school) that is.

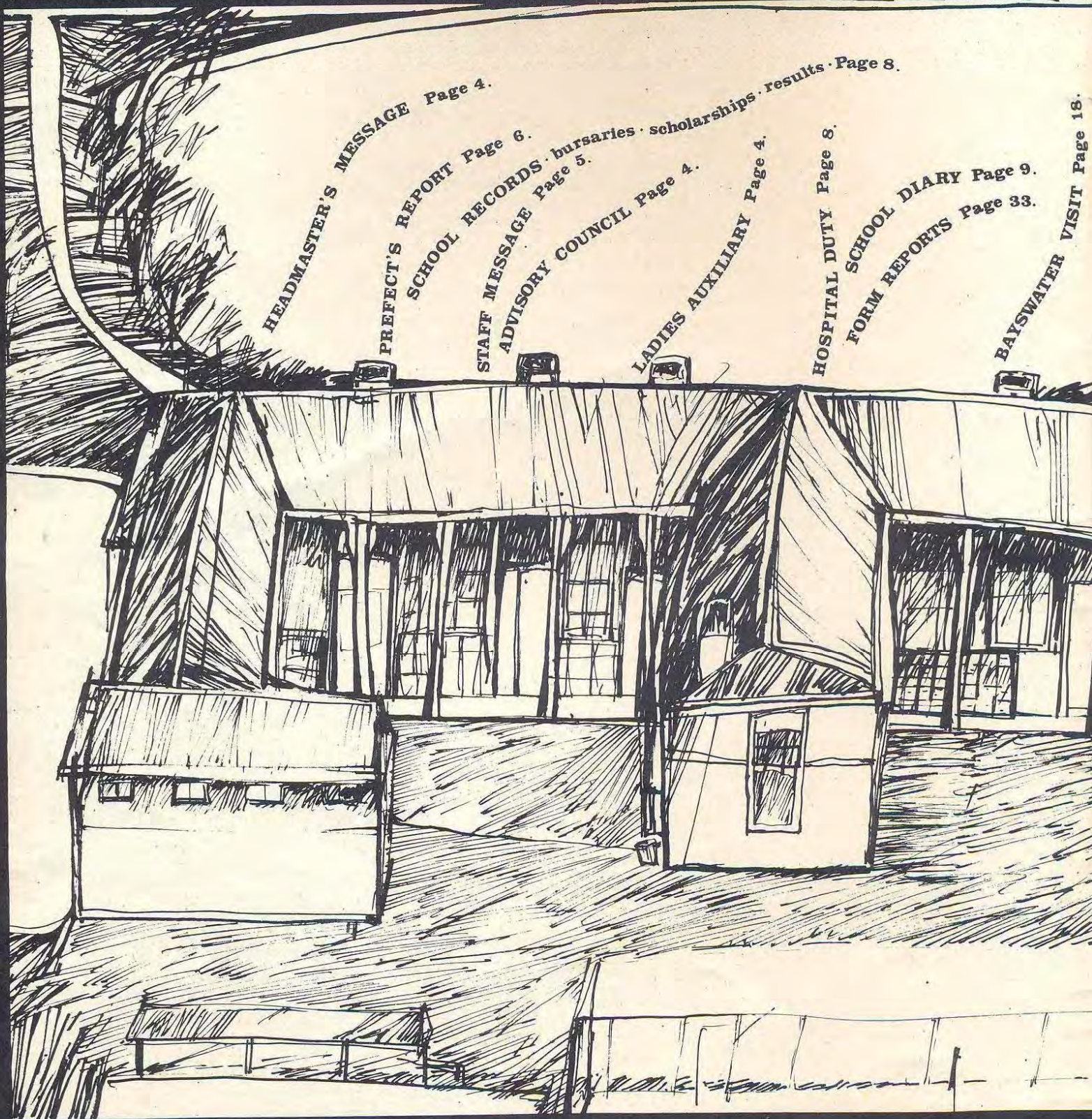
But we miss the drink of milk we used to get at state school.

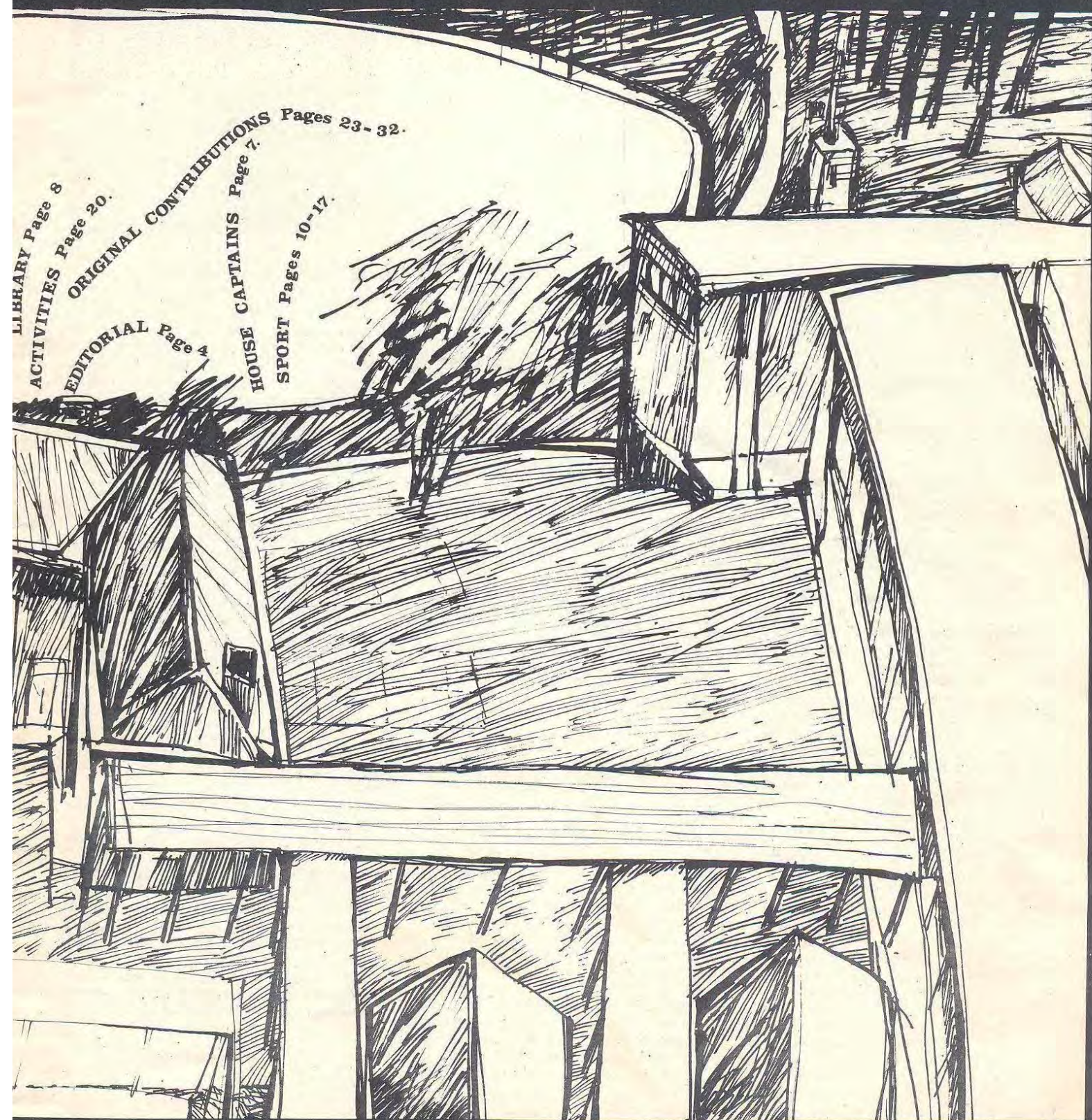

MAGAZINE

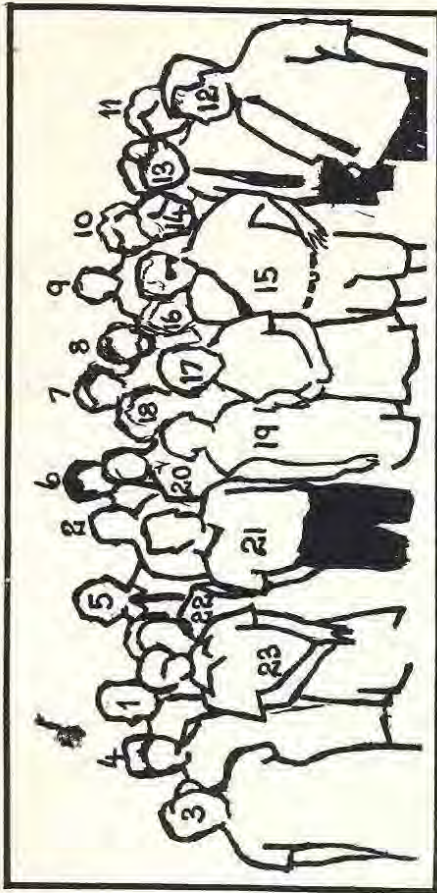

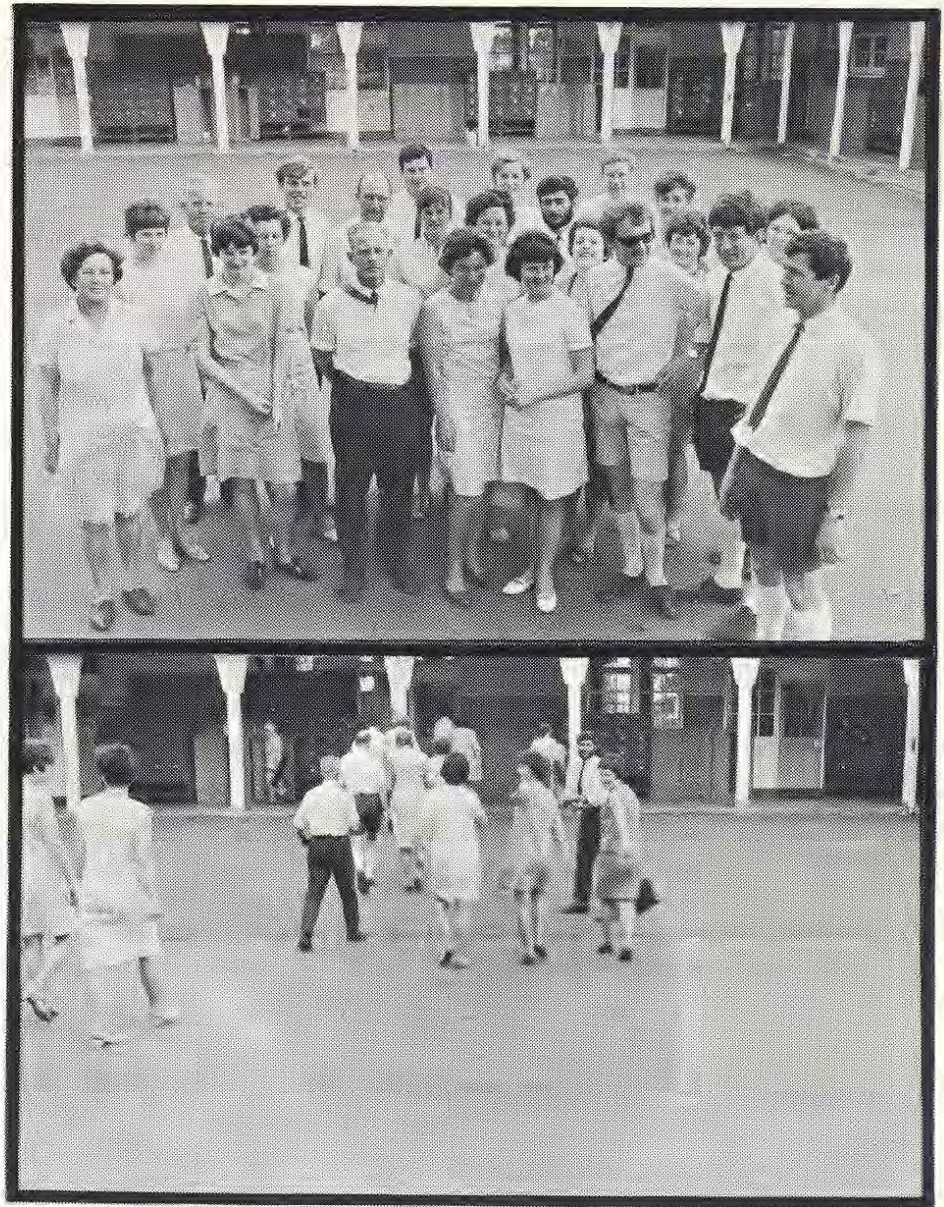
And thanks to Mr. Hoare of the Express Printers for his help and advice when we needed it, in the production of the Pylon.

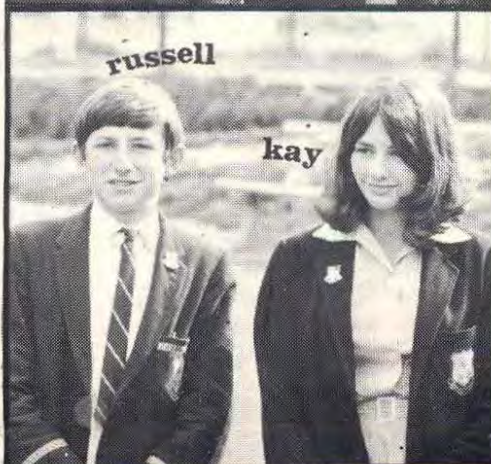
Flinders

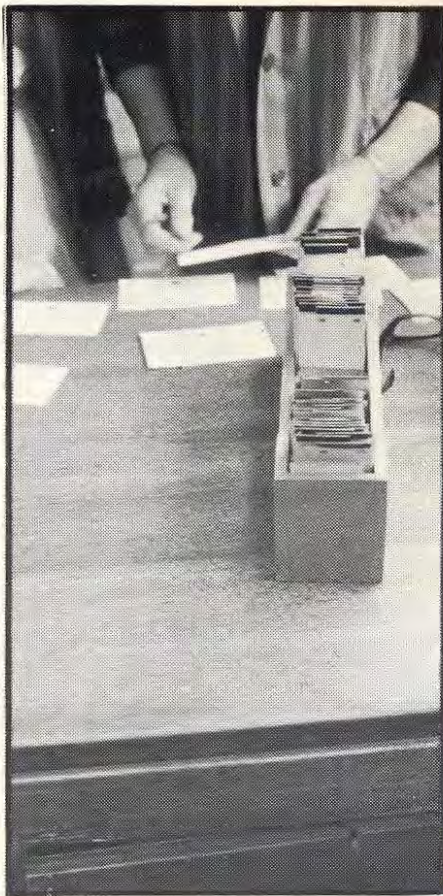
Phillip

The first major sporting feature of the year of 1967 was the Inter-House Swimming Carnival at the Yallourn Pool. Phillip House gained the greatest number of points, and individual champions were T. Dolphin, J. Gray, C. Sutcliffe, C. Kotiw, R. Dolphin, E. Kimberly, K. Bussell, C. Swindon, J. Williams, S. Oliver, J. Davis, C. Dell and J. Ashmead.

Yallourn High School was host for the C.G.S.S.S.A. Combined Swimming Sports, and in the face of staunch opposition our swimmers gained considerable merit, winning the Open Girls Shield, and coming second in the Intermediate and Senior Girls, and equal second in the Senior Boys. Swimmers who earned credit for their performances were T. Dolphin, J. Williams, C. Kotiw, J. Davis, C. Swindon, J. Gray, R. Dolphin, K. Bussell, S. Oliver, G. Sneddon, J. Kitney and E. Kimberly.

This year has seen some major changes in the sporting activities of Yallourn High School.

The principle development was the re-organization of our Central Gippsland Secondary Schools Sports Association so that at present it includes Maryvale Morwell, Newborough, Traralgon and Yallourn High Schools, and St. Paul's and Kildare Colleges of Traralgon.

Within the Association summer sports competitions in Term One and winter sports competitions in Term Two were held between all schools in the C.G.S.S.S.A.

The final results tend to indicate that Yallourn did not have a very successful year of competition, and this can be attributed principally to the fact that we did not have the numbers from which to select, as all schools apart from Maryvale have a much larger student population than Yallourn's. We can, however, be proud of all team competitors for the creditable way in which they represented the school.

The Inter-House Athletic Sports were held on Oval 3, at the end of Term One and because of the excellent performances on the track, and the ideal weather, the entire school enjoyed a marvellous day. Individual performances are too numerous to note here, but the record shattering mile of COLIN DELL was the highlight of the day. Mawson won the Grand Aggregate and Girls Aggregate, Bass the Boys Aggregate.

The highlight of the school year was without doubt the visit of Bayswater High School. Although the sporting events were the highlight of the visit, social exchanges were the most beneficial to students from both schools. Yallourn ran out easy winners for the Baylorn Trophy winning all sporting events apart from the Football and Tennis, and drawing the Baseball.

Just prior to the Bayswater visit the School Cross Country run was held over a four mile course which included all types of terrain. The outright winner of the Senior, was Russell Hawken, followed closely by C. Dell, L. McPherson, and Jeff Browitt. Michael Levijens was winner of the Juniors.

Jones all earned valuable points for Yallourn.

In the inter-school field our fortunes well varied the Senior and Junior Football Teams did not manage to win a
