But for those who have no such friends or are unable to turn to them because they are embarrassed, wish to bring to your attention the organization called "Life Line". Life Oine offers immed-iate help in time of trouble and attention there is no charge; help is as close as the telephone.

Life Line is based on the idea of Rev. Alan Walker, superinten-dent of the Central Methodist Methodist dent of the Central methodist Mission in Sydney. Life Line s a 24 hour every day service to those in the community who are in need of help. He based his idea on the telephone because most of us have access to telephones which is the main medium for communication in our world today.

It was established in Sydnet 19 and since then there has been a rapid development into an international movement over a

period of 9 years.

stand the caller's distress. Many have thought that "Life line" is an important service in the r city, but they will never need it. However, a turn of circumstances or some simple problem, compornded by others, has meant that the time has come when they've needed to call the emergency number. Not that this is a bad thing because Life Line is not set up simply far those who have great problems but also who have great problems but also for those who are upset about trigles. One young person interviewed on a television programme after attempting suicide said; "I thought that I might call Life Line, but felt that there might be someone else who needed talk to them more than I, s to

Next term the Matriculation students will be going on an English camp to Mirboo North With Moe, Newborough and Trafalgar HIgh schools joining them for the four day seminar.


