Mr. Debarro Snr. is employed in the Power House with the S.E.C at Yallourn and Mario works in the Post Office at Newborough.

Mr. Debarro Snr, a former actor and stage manager with a theatre group in his cld country, Malta, has been following his hobby for over 40 years.

During the past few years he has made scenery (from paper, wire and glue) for many stage plays and debutante balls.

TAUGHT SON

He taught his son, Mario, the art of paper work but Mrs. Debarro takes the credit for his sewing of the costumes.

At present Mario is working on making costumes for 44 people in a play to be presented at St. Kieran's.
