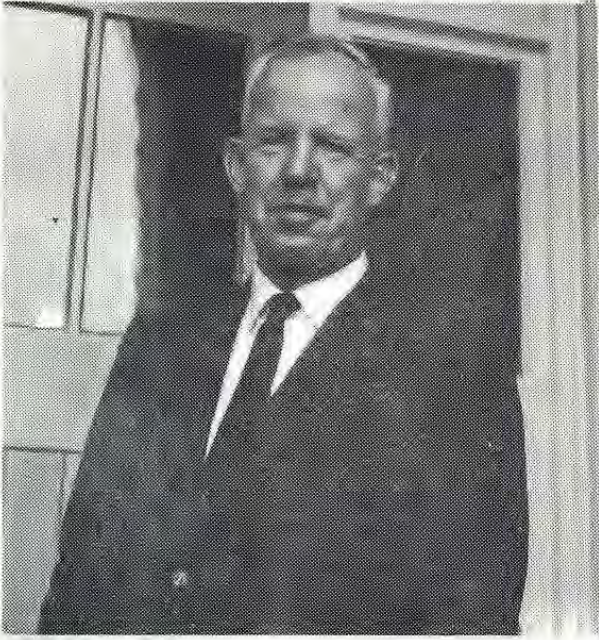

Modern education thinking goes beyond the terms of performance in narrow traditional subject fields. Not only has education included more subject areas to lead young people to examine critically and evaluate the aims and attitudes of the society in which they live, so that they may accept that which is worthwhile and reject that which is of no value. As a result the contributions that may be made to social, economic, and civil progress should be of increasing value.

Thus the school's greatest contribution to the growth of a positive contributing social being may not necessarily be in formal learning. In spite of increasing and considerable outside pressures it does much to help youngsters develop a social conscience. It cannot however handle these tasks alone. It needs the whole hearted support of family and community so that its product will be a well adjusted youngster ready to make a worthwhile contribution towards real progress.

Despite what rumours may suggest we did not have too much trouble with Fleas.

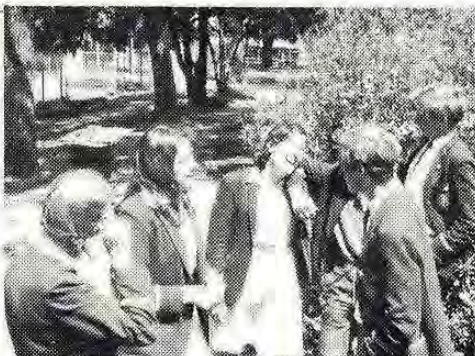

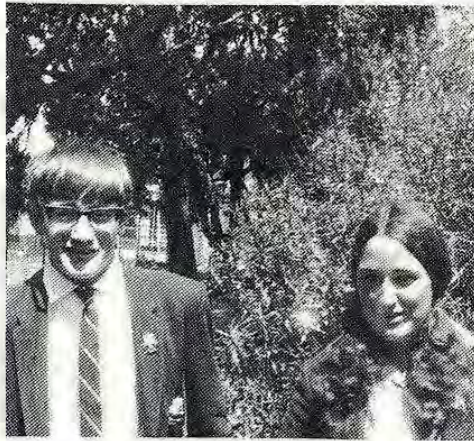
MAWSON

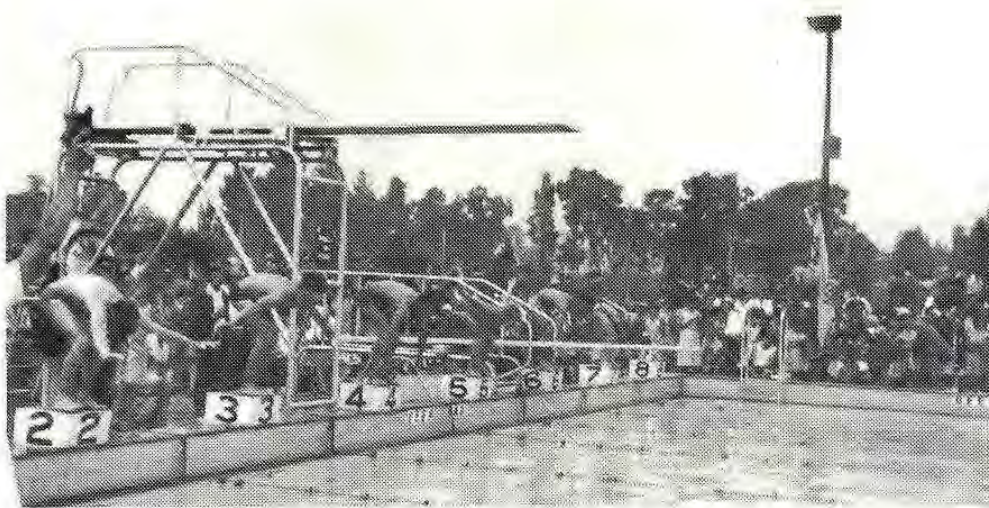

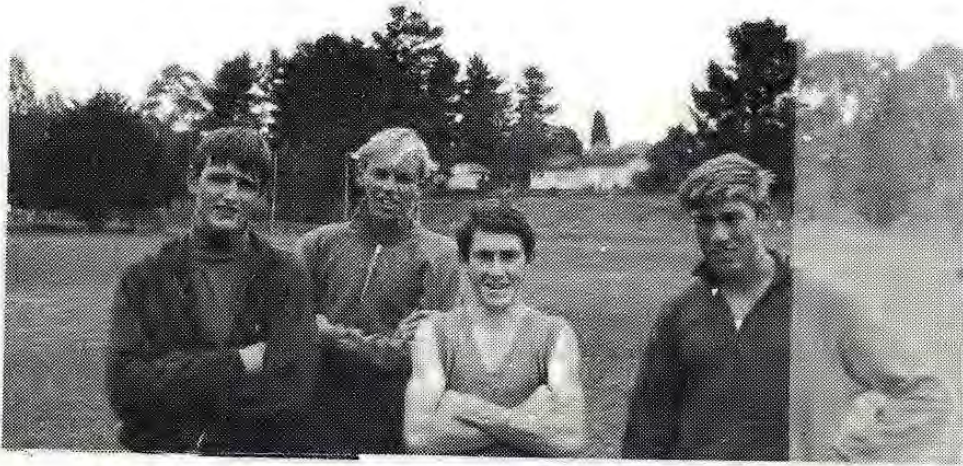

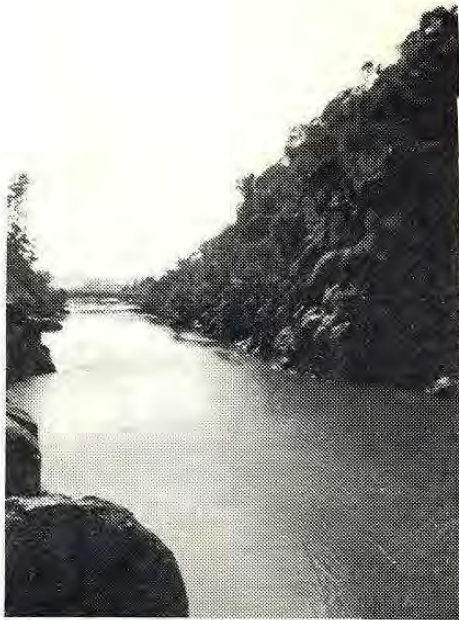

TASMANIAN TRIPS



Wednesday 24th September saw forty-nine students and three teachers leaving the school by bus at 6.30 a.m.
